Father's Day Trivia

The origins of Father's Day

It was while listening to a Mother's Day talk in 1909 that the idea of Father's Day suddenly struck Spokane, Washington resident <u>Sonora Dodd</u>. She wanted to honor her own father, William Smart, who was a widowed farmer left alone to raise his six kids single-handedly.

Residents embraced the idea so warmly that by June 19, 1910 the first Father's Day celebration was proclaimed in Spokane because it was the month of Dodd's father's birth.

Decades later, the first presidential proclamation honoring fathers was issued in 1966 when President Lyndon Johnson designated the third Sunday in June as Father's Day.

Father's Day in America has been officially celebrated annually since 1972 when President Richard Nixon signed the public law that made it permanent. Due to her efforts, Sonora Dodd is now known as "the mother of Father's Day".

Did you know?

Roses are the official flower for Father's Day. A red rose is worn in the lapel if your father is living, a white rose if he is deceased.

Father's Day is celebrated most places on the third Sunday in June, but not everywhere. In Spain and Portugal, for instance, fathers are honored on St. Joseph's Day on March 19. In Australia, it's the first Sunday in September.

This is a big day for the 70.1 million fathers in America. Nearly 95 million Father's Day cards were given last year in the United States, making Father's Day the fourth-largest card-sending occasion. And don't forget the tie! The most traditional gift given.

Elder Abuse Awareness Day

Fighting Elder Abuse is a top priority for the Oregon Department of Justice and Attorney General Ellen Rosenblum. With the COVID-19 pandemic and increased isolation of the elderly, the opportunity for financial and physical abuse is at an all-time high. Oregon DOJ joins other organizations fighting against elder abuse as part of an international movement to raise awareness.

Some warning signs of possible elder abuse include:

- · Any unexplained or suspicious injury
- Situations where the elder is not given the opportunity to speak for themselves without the presence of the caregiver
- Elders who have suddenly become extremely withdrawn, noncommunicative or nonresponsive
- Sudden changes in the elder's financial situation (shutoff notices, unpaid bills, new credit cards, plummeting credit, etc.)

Some recent scams we have uncovered include:

- · A "bail bondsman" calls requesting money to get a grandchild out of jail
 - Oregon does not have a bail bondsman system
- Someone pretending to be from a bank asks for account information to facilitate the elder getting a stimulus check
 - The federal government distributes stimulus checks and will not ask for account information over the phone

If you suspect an older adult is being abused call 1-855-503-SAFE (7233) or contact the local law enforcement agency where the older adult lives. One call could rescue an older adult who is unable to speak for themselves.



If the County cannot go to **LOW Risk**, the pool will not open. There will be no pool passes sold this year due to the gathering restrictions.


