January 28th is National Daisy Day! Here are a few fun facts about Daisy's

The word daisy derives from the Old English language "day's eye" because it's petals bloom at dawn and close as sunset.

In England, this every day flower is often referred to as bruisewort because its leaves would be crushed for a medicinal remedy to help soothe bruised skin.

Daisies are often referred to as composite flowers; meaning they are flowers within flowers. The yellow disk floret that is iconic for the daisy is actually a collection of smaller florals all clustered together.

While the daisy is part of the Asteraceae family, there are thousand of variations within the family.
Native to western, central, and northern Europe, daisies are now pretty much found everywhere in the Americas and Australia. What was originally considered a weed, daisies today are valuable for landscaping purposes.


- Staff is in process of rebuilding our filters at the water plant, along with valve and flow control upgrades

Alert your family first if you're in a crash

If you are in a crash or other situation where you can't communicate with emergency responders, a new service for Oregonians will help police contact your family faster.

With today's speed of online information, especially with mobile phone video and pictures through social media, there is a risk your friends and family could learn you're in an emergency before law enforcement can contact your family. That's a traumatic way to get such critical information – and possibly misinformation.

That's one reason many states, including Oregon, are setting up emergency contact registries through their DMVs.

The 2021 Oregon Legislature, under House Bill 3125, created an emergency contact service for Oregon residents. Starting Jan. 3, 2022, you can register up to two people, age 18 and older, as emergency contacts for situations where you can't communicate.

Only Oregon law enforcement personnel will be able to access your emergency contact information. They are able to do so securely through their patrol cars so they can contact your loved ones quickly. Your emergency contacts can be anyone you choose – family or friends. The only exception is if you are under age 18 – then you must include a parent or legal guardian as one of your contacts. A parent or legal guardian can also register as an emergency contact for their children under 18 years old.

To register, go to <u>DMV2U.Oregon.gov</u> and sign in to "Access My DMV Profile." You need to have an Oregon driver license, permit or identification card to register with the service. Ask your family and friends to register their emergency contacts too! The emergency contact registry is the newest among more than 20 services DMV has created on DMV2U in the past two years. These and other new DMV services are part of ODOT's commitment to put new technology to use to make Oregon's transportation system safer, more efficient and more user friendly.

Now you can! At DMV2U

Before you visit a DMV office, see if you can get the DMV service you need at <u>DMV2U.Oregon.gov</u>. DMV has added over 20 new services to DMV2U including driver license renewal, and you can make an appointment for services that must be done in person – such as applying for a new license or the Real ID option for air travel.

Get ready for air travel now

If you travel by air or might in the future, make sure you have identification acceptable at airport security checkpoints. Starting in May 2023, you will need a Real ID-compliant form of ID for all flights such as a Real ID-compliant state driver license, passport, passport card or U.S. military ID. Don't wait until the rush for Real ID licenses and passports! If you want the Real ID option on your Oregon driver license or ID card, you must apply in person – walk in or by appointment. To make sure you have all you need for Real ID, create your own checklist of documents you'll need to bring to DMV with our online tool at <u>Oregon.gov/RealID</u>. ####

Get that spring back in your step for a slam dunk!

This week we will share some information about the City of Carlton's Municipal Code as it relates to basketball hoops:

The City Code does not allow items that obstruct the street or sidewalk. Unless written permission is obtained from the marshal, citizens and businesses may not park, place or leave anything that, in any way, impedes the traffic or obstructs the view upon any street, alley, parking strip, sidewalk, or curb of the city. Remember to return basketball hoops onto your property after use in the street or on the sidewalk to accommodate for this ordinance.



- Snap photos of important documents and save them in a secure place or online.
- Set up group text lists so you can communicate with friends and family during emergencies.
- Take a class in CPR and first aid.
- Keep and update emergency supplies; remember to include cash.
- Have back-up power sources available to charge devices in case of a power outage.
- Snap pictures of your property for insurance purposes.
- Check your insurance for coverage on disasters like floods, hurricanes, and earthquakes.
- Sign up for alerts and warnings. Download the FEMA app to get real-time alerts, safety tips, and locate open shelters.
- Save for a rainy day! Start and grow your emergency fund.
- Financially prepare for the New Year. Find out how with the <u>Emergency Financial First Aid Kit</u>.
- Spend within your means. Use a personal budgeting worksheet to help plan for holiday expenses and beyond.
- Build up your savings. Put a small amount in your account the first of every month beginning January 1.

The Carlton Civic building is a proposed 12,854 sf building which will house over 1900 sf of community space, the Carlton City Hall and Public Safety Department.

Included in the proposal are efforts to provide public restrooms, an interactive history of Carlton, a hub for local business networking, and flexible community space that will house a variety of functions including public and private events.

We need your Input!

Oregon is required to establish Total Maximum Daily Loads (TMDL) for streams segments which do not meet water quality standards. The TMDL identifies the level of pollutants that a water body can absorb and still meet water quality standards.

The City of Carlton has both the Yamhill river and Hawn Creek near and through it. It is important to keep these waterways clean for fish and wildlife use. The City will soon begin developing our own required Water Quality Management plan and we need your input. If you could spare a few moments of time and share your thoughts, we would appreciate your time and responses.

ADA curb ramps Construction in 2022

ODOT is installing ADA compliant curb ramps on the corners of several intersections in Carlton. ODOT plans to construct one corner of an intersection at a time, with up to five intersections under construction at once. When construction starts, expect ODOT crews working during the day and at night as needed. During construction, the project webpage or <u>Tripcheck.com</u> will have the most up to date information about impacts. OR 47 realignment design is underway
