# OR 47: Realignment Project in Carlton

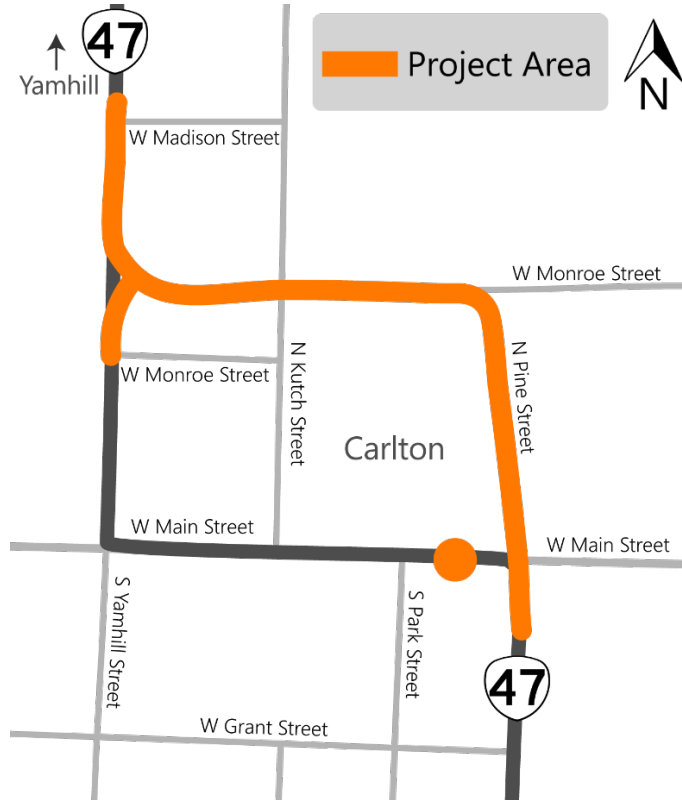

## High Temperature Safety



Hot temperatures are coming and many visit the Yamhill river in Wennerberg Park.

The Carlton Police Department will be proactively conducting welfare checks of individuals associated with at risk community members that include but are not limited to families, elderly, and other potential at risk citizens.

Over the course of the next few days, the hot weather and humid conditions are expected to remain in place, We encourage residents to limit the amount of time they are outside as those exposed to extreme heat for a prolonged period of time can fall victim to heat exhaustion or life-threatening heat stroke.

To prevent illness and injuries, the Carlton Police Department recommends the following safety tips from the American Red Cross and National Safety Council:

Heat Safety Tips:

- Hot cars can be deadly. Never leave children or pets in your vehicle. The inside temperature of the car can quickly reach over 100 degrees, even on a 70 degree day.
- Stay hydrated by drinking plenty of fluids, like water.
- Check on family, friends and neighbors who do not have air conditioning, who spend much of their time alone or who are more likely to be affected by the heat.
- If someone doesn't have air conditioning, they should seek relief from the heat during the warmest part of the day in places like libraries, theaters, malls, etc.
- Wear loose-fitting, lightweight, light-colored clothing. Avoid dark colors because they absorb the sun's rays.
- Slow down, stay indoors and avoid strenuous exercise during the hottest part of the day, which is typically around 3 p.m.
- Postpone outdoor games and activities if the temperature is too hot.
- Avoid extreme temperature changes.
- Take frequent breaks if working outdoors.
- Check on animals frequently to ensure that they are not suffering from the heat. Make sure they have plenty of cool water.

### Additional Tips for Parents:

- Limit playtime at peak sun exposure time and familiarize yourself with the signs of heat illnesses.
- Avoid burns. If playground equipment is hot to the touch, it is too hot for your child's bare skin.

## ADA curb ramps Construction coming soon

Phase 1 of the ADA construction project is set to kick off in a few weeks. As we get closer, we will let you know where and when to expect work. ODOT is installing ADA compliant curb ramps on the corners of several intersections in Carlton. ODOT plans to construct one corner of an intersection at a time, with up to five intersections under construction at once. When construction starts, expect ODOT crews working during the day and at night as needed. As with all construction projects there are unexpected occurrences. We appreciate your patience and understanding.

## Public Works

### Water

- Painting at the water plant is scheduled to be completed this week
- Dredging project is scheduled to reconvene July 15<sup>th</sup>
- Meadow lake transmission line change order for section of pipe between concrete reservoir and steel reservoir work has begun and should be completed before July 4<sup>th</sup>

### Sewer

- Hawn Creek pump station project is upgrading the sewer main prior to the headworks at Main pump station
- Lagoon aerators, blowers and conductors installed. Transformer should be here by July 4<sup>th</sup>
- One sewer lateral repaired last week on Kennedy court
- Main pump station had problems coming out of the weekend with a power surge that affected the main control center. It will be repaired Wednesday

## Carlton Code Corner

Summer maintenance means a whole lot of lawn mowing, brush management and tree trimming. Remember that maintaining your vegetation contributes to the community!

Owners and residents must maintain any grass, weeds and other \*noxious vegetation more at less than ten (10) inches in height. They must also remove dead bushes, grass, trees, debris and other things from the property to prevent a fire or public safety hazard.

- ⇒ All vegetation must conform to clear vision standards allowing for pedestrians and vehicles to navigate sidewalks and streets safely.
- ⇒ Trees must be trimmed to the trunk at least eight (8) feet over walks and pedestrian paths, and to a minimum height of fifteen (15) feet over streets and vehicular traffic areas.

- ⇒ Property owners shall maintain and keep in repair pedestrian paths, sidewalks, parking strips and \*\*planting strips in the public rights-of-way that are in front of, adjacent to, or abutting upon the property
- ⇒ Maintenance of planting strips includes mowing the grass regularly and periodic pruning of all plantings and trees located within the planting strip to avoid encroachment on the adjacent sidewalks and roadway

\*\* “Planting strip” means the portion of area between a private property line and the curb or edge of pavement or traveled way which is not improved by a sidewalk.

**Carlton Fire District Receives Canned Drinking Water from Anheuser-Busch to Support Wildfire Response Efforts**  
*Water donated through a partnership with the National Volunteer Fire Council*

Carlton Fire District recently received a donation of canned emergency drinking water from leading brewer, Anheuser-Busch, to help provide critical hydration to its responders during this year's wildfire season. On June 6, 2022, Maletis Beverage, a local Anheuser-Busch wholesaler partner, dropped off 1 pallet (96 cases) to the department to help support its wildfire response needs. Maintaining firefighters' hydration during long incidents or disasters such as wildfires is a major safety concern for many departments.

Carlton Fire District is comprised of approximately 39 square miles. The district currently has 13 Volunteer member that respond to approximately 400 call for service per year.

"Firefighters lose a tremendous amount of fluid during high-intensity response such as battling wildfires. Proper hydration is critical to ensure the safety of our firefighters and to keep them performing at their best," said Chief Lucich. "Thanks to this water donation from Anheuser-Busch and the National Volunteer Fire Council, we have the resources to keep our firefighters hydrated and ready to respond."

The water was donated by Anheuser-Busch through a partnership with the National Volunteer Fire Council (NVFC). Anheuser-Busch has a longstanding tradition of providing emergency drinking water and supplies for disaster relief efforts. The company periodically pauses beer production each year to apply its production and logistics expertise to can clean, safe drinking water that is ready to distribute when disaster strikes. Since 1988, the brewer has donated more than 90 million cans of emergency drinking water to communities impacted by natural disasters and other crises.

Building on this commitment, the brewer teamed up with the NVFC – the leading nonprofit membership association representing the interests of the volunteer fire, emergency medical, and rescue services – in 2019 to provide emergency drinking water to help firefighters stay hydrated and healthy when responding to wildfires and large incidents. To date, the program has donated nearly 4.9 million cans of water to volunteer firefighters across the country.
