Groundbreaking Ceremony



Citizens of Carlton,

On March 10, 2023, at 1:30 p.m., the City of Carlton held the Groundbreaking Ceremony for the new Carlton Civic Center on the building site of the old city hall at Main St. and 1st St.

The event was an exciting time to celebrate a significant milestone in Carlton's future. The overall design of the Civic Center was focused on enhancing services for our citizens, such as providing a location where community members can come and interact with city staff and Councilors and hold various events. About 40 people attended the event, including Carlton citizens, the Mayor, Carlton City Council Members, Yamhill County Commissioner Kit Johnston, and a member of Representative Elmer's Office.

In addition to being available to the community, the community room serves as the Council Chambers, Municipal Court, and Planning Commission meetings. The community room will also hold various Town Hall meetings and presentations, such as the police department's Project I.M.P.A.C.T meetings which provide citizens with information about various safety and emergency preparedness topics.

The Civic Center will be able to act as an Emergency Operations Center and location to provide safety and/or aid for our citizens in times of disasters or crisis. The Civic Center building will have the ability to sustain its structural integrity during earthquakes and other natural disasters and maintain its ability to remain operational during this disaster to serve the citizens of Carlton.

We are excited to have a building that honors Carlton's history, provides resources for the present, and prepares us for our future.



The City of Carlton has a set of ordinances that apply specifically to our canine companions. In order to maintain the health and safety of all our citizens please keep in mind the following guidelines-

Owners or keepers of a dog should are not:

- A. To have a dog running at large; "At large" means off the premises of the owner or custodian of the animal or fowl, and not under the immediate control of the owner or custodian
- B. To allow a dog to become a public nuisance, except that a dog shall not be considered a public nuisance under this chapter if the dog bites a person who is wrongfully assaulting the dog or the dog's owner, or if the dog bites a person trespassing on the premises occupied by the dog's owner, and has been provoked by that person;
- C. To keep a dog with knowledge that it has injured other domestic animals;

Anyone violating these ordinances may be subject to fines in addition to any charges assessed against the owner/keeper.



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Out & About

With this lovely spring weather upon us, it's only natural that people and pets alike are eager to spend more time outdoors. However, the Carlton Police Department has responded to several loose dog calls over the last week. Not only does this pose a safety risk to the dog and the community, but trying to track down an owner can be very time consuming and can tie up officers for extended periods of time.

Often these dogs are reported as exhibiting aggressive behavior. The most recent incident involved a loose dog going onto another resident's property and significantly injuring several sheep. Due to how problematic these situations are, the owner of the dog will often end up being cited for allowing the dog to run at large, in addition to other charges.

In order to prevent these kinds of issues, we would like to remind K-9 owners to be mindful of keeping their dogs safely and securely in their control. This will be beneficial not only to the dogs and people of the community, but it will also help minimize the amount of time and resources spent by City Officers having to respond and investigate running-at-large calls.
