Community Alert!

The invasive Emerald Ash Borer has been found in parks in Cornelius, OR. We have several Ash trees in the lower park, please be on the look out and report any sightings of these pests!





August 2023

Trees surveyed to date: 9,407 (95% are trees in Washington County)

of trees with confirmed EAB presence: 130

Square miles known to be infested with EAB: 2.9

In this issue:

- EAB found in ash trees in Cornelius
- Most calls to the state's invasive species hotline are look-alikes
- Peak emergence of EAB adults has passed
- No EAB found so far in traps in outlying counties

EAB confirmed in ash trees at two Cornelius parks

The Oregon Dept. of Agriculture (ODA) has confirmed the presence of emerald ash borer in ash trees in two parks in Cornelius, a community of over 13,000 people in Washington County just east of Forest Grove. Both parks are less than two miles from the site in Forest Grove where EAB was first discovered in June 2022. Tarrybrooke and Harleman parks are only about a quarter of a mile apart on the city's westside. The presence of EAB in ash trees in those parks is not unexpected given the closeness to the first site reported last year. Cornelius residents, like the rest of Washington County, are already under a wood quarantine to help slow the spread of EAB to areas outside the county.

Code Corner



You have likely noticed some of the construction projects happening within the city. Because of the potential disruption some may experience during work on a construction site, we wanted to share a few applicable ordinances:

Noise Levels

- Construction crews are responsible for maintaining reasonable noise levels between 7:00am-7:00pm during week days, and 8:00am-7:00pm on weekends and city holidays
- Emergency work does not require written authorization for special work hours

Accessible Equipment

• During the course of construction, crews may maintain equipment, devices and materials as necessary, so long as reasonable safeguards are maintained to prevent injury to the public

Right of Way Access

• No equipment, materials or vehicles are to obstruct the sidewalk, pedestrian path or other right-of-way spaces outside of the construction site

Permitting

• Any firm or corporation seeking to erect, enlarge, or repair a building within the city of Carlton must apply and receive a permit for the proposed work.

Please obey any signs crews set up to ensure your safety.

Slow Down: Back to School Means Sharing the Road

Head Up, Phone Down

School days bring congestion: School buses are picking up their passengers, kids on bikes are hurrying to get to school before the bell rings, harried parents are trying to drop their kids off before work. It's never more important for drivers to slow down and pay attention than when kids are present — especially before and after school.

Sharing the Road with Young Pedestrians

- Don't block the crosswalk when stopped at a red light or waiting to make a turn, forcing pedestrians to go around you; this could put them in the path of moving traffic
- Be extra vigilant in school zones and residential neighborhoods
- In a school zone when flashers are blinking, stop and yield to pedestrians crossing the crosswalk or intersection
- Always stop for a school patrol officer or crossing guard holding up a stop sign
- Take extra care to look for children in school zones, near playgrounds and parks, and in all residential areas
- Never pass a vehicle stopped for pedestrians
- Always use extreme caution to avoid striking pedestrians wherever they may be, no matter who has the right of way
- If you're driving behind a bus, allow a greater following distance than if you were driving behind a car. It will give you more time to stop once the lights start flashing. It is illegal in all 50 states to pass a school bus that is stopped to load or unload children.
- Traffic must stop from BOTH lanes of traffic when the bus is stopped with the red light flashing during the loading or unloading of children

By exercising a little extra care and caution, drivers and pedestrians can co-exist safely in school zones.
